Remembering Maxine Middleton

A legacy of inspiration and selflessness

On paper, Maxine "Max" Middleton was an educator. Though if you talk to her husband, Scott, that was simply the best way for her to earn a living doing what she loved most: connecting with people on an individual level.


To those that knew her – which would inevitably be anyone with whom she came in contact – she was an engaged listener, an impassioned guide, and a caring friend.

When Max passed away in November of 2021 after a 14-year battle with breast cancer, there was a void left in every person with whom the late Alliance City Schools teacher interacted.

Her selflessness permeated every aspect of her life. From rescuing dogs and training them as service animals, to meeting and becoming a resource to families in the cancer ward while fighting her own battle with the horrible disease, Max was a beacon who nearly always had a smile on her face.

"She was the first call for so many people including those in the cancer community," Scott said. "She was involved for years both publicly and privately, and was truly friends with patients, nurses, doc-

tors, and staff.""



To properly recognize the imprint Max left on the world, she and Scott worked on establishing the Maxine Middleton Charitable Fund prior to her passing. The fund does not have one specific cause in recognizing that different people have different paths. needs, and challenges. "Max and I agreed to work toward and continue her legacy of helping others (although admittedly she was hesitant about it being in her name, because it was never about her personally)," Scott shared. "Our goal is to find a way to help those who just need a lift at the right time, be it a scholarship, assistance to a trade program, or whatever is needed at local cancer centers and charities."

Currently, the fund is working with three organizations that were near to Max's heart. Camp Wise, an overnight camp for children and teens of Jewish faith in Chardon, Alliance City Schools in technology, where Max was a teacher, and the Josette Beddell Memorial Foundation of Canton, which assists local families affected by breast cancer. These are a few avenues the fund aims to support that are reflective of the altruistic life Max led.



"You were the most important person in the world when you were with her," Scott said. "She was such an easy person to get to know. She could cut through the formalities and get to the meaningful parts of a conversation with a smile"

Honoring Our Vietnam Veterans

GAF supports local efforts and a new monument in Memorial Park

As the valiant men and women who served in the Vietnam War enter the latter stages of their incredible lives of service, the Thomas A. Mangino Chapter Vietnam Veterans of America Fund is ensuring those individuals are supported.

Bob Akins, a member of the chapter who served 22 months in Vietnam, is grateful for the support of both the Alliance community and GAF in their endeavors.

"The comfort is knowing that the fund is there for veterans in the community, and we are very pleased to be working with the Foundation," Akins said. "Even when our organization eventually dissipates, this ensures that money earned by veterans will be able to support other generations of veterans in the community."

GAF also assisted in securing grant funding to help construct the monument and bench in Memorial Park to recognize Mangino, who is still listed as missing in action, and Ralph E. Hunt, Jr., who died in Vietnam.

"These markers mean a lot to me as a veteran because there was nothing in Alliance to honor the veterans of this war," Akins said. "The community response has been overwhelming, and I appreciate those who have offered their support."

Helping Alliance Become More Accessible

The 53 Accessible Alliance Fund to open new doors

A diagnosis of ALS might stop many people in their tracks, but with the help of the GAF, Chad McClung and his family are focusing their energy on making Alliance more accessible to others

"We hope to help people get out into nature easier and develop more accessible trails for

the elderly with gait/balance issues, or mothers with strollers and wagons," Chad said. "I enjoy the outdoors and find it challenging to be in the woods in Alliance."

Last summer, when he still had finite motor skills, Chad built more than 50 bird houses to donate, but wanted to place them where he can go and see the life that eventually will inhabit them.

Two years after Chad's Lou Gehrig's Disease diagnosis, the McClungs established the new 53 Accessible Alliance Fund through GAF. The purpose of the fund is to create accessible trails in the local park system and at Beech Creek Botanical Gardens. The family's ultimate hope is to, "make a difference in the lives of those that come after Chad with this community improve-

ment project and to place awareness on this issue."


The number 53 is significant because Chad turned 53 years-old this year and his birthday served as the kickoff for the fund's grassroots fundraising campaign. In a mere 18 days since the announcement of the fund, more than \$53,000 was raised for this incredible initiative for Alliance.

Proceeds from a t-shirt campaign and gifts from community organizations have added more and with the rising cost of materials and labor, the family has decided to continue to grow this fund to do more in Alliance for their neighbors.

Local libraries are a fantastic resource for communities. As such, the purpose of the Friends of the Rodman Public Library is to maintain interest of individuals in libraries, publicize and stimulate use of the resources offered, and satisfy the needs of the library through fundraising of volunteer efforts. This impactful organization has partnered with the Foundation to help establish and grow the Friends of the Rodman Public Library Fund and raise awareness about its efforts.

"Friends of the Rodman Library appreciates how GAF works with nonprofits, and we want to have GAF help us grow our investments," said Barb Burley, president of Friends of the Rodman Library. "We learned about how other nonprofits have used the GAF Together Fund and how it helps them, and we wanted to become a part of it."

The most visible initiative of the Friends of the Rodman Library is its Annual Book Sale during the Carnation Festival. The sale, which has raised more than \$10,000 in years past, has been used to sponsor child, teen, and adult summer reading programs; library travel and book reviews; and the purchase of media equipment such as computers and projectors, among other endeavors.

"GAF has allowed Friends of the Rodman Library to use the Alliance Neighborhood Center for the Annual Book Sale," Burley said. "As a result, we had more space, sold more books, and attracted more participants – that was a real blessing. We hope to add to our fund at GAF after each book sale."

A Fitting Fund For Downtown

The Anthony Lalli Fund created to keep downtown thriving

A friend and advocate of the Alliance community for more than nine decades until his passing in March of 2020, Anthony "Tony" Lalli, Jr. was a beacon for small business owners in the community. He began his career working at Persky's Grocery Store as a teen with the late Joe Mastroianni, another community leader in-waiting. After migrating to the dry-cleaning industry, he worked his way to his eventual status in owning and operating Ideal Cleaners and Laundry at 544 E. Main St. downtown for more than 30 years.

Due to Tony's long association with downtown Alliance, the Foundation trustees decided to create a fund in his memory to benefit the downtown area through a portion of the residuum from the charitable gift annuity trusts he established in 2005 and 2013.

The Anthony Lalli Downtown Fund will serve as a fitting tribute to honor Tony's memory and continue his legacy, helping ensure downtown Alliance can be a

"Its members, who numbered over 300 at one time, supported many programs and projects that promoted women's activities and interests. It is hoped that by being a part of the Greater Alliance Foundation, annual grants from

The YWCA Together Fund gets matching support

"Everyone who supports the YWCA is supporting their community," is a belief stressed by Stacie Weimer, executive director of the Alliance YWCA. when discussing the YWCA Together Fund. The purpose of the Together Fund is that the Foundation will add five percent to a gift of \$100 or more that is paid directly to the Foundation for the benefit of the YWCA. In partnering with GAF and its five percent match, gifts to the fund can go toward general operating expenses for the agency, or to designated areas such as Meals on Wheels, Navigators, or scholarships.

"Those who support the Together Fund are allowing us to stretch our dollars even further for more impact," Weimer said. "This assistance means, for example, that we can provide school supplies for an extra child for an entire school year."

GAF Founders Recognized

The Alliance Shade Tree Commission Celebrates Arbor Day

The Greater Alliance Foundation would not be what it is today without the foresight and leadership of its co-founders, the late Jack Peters and the late Charlie Grove. On Arbor Day, the Alliance Shade Tree Commission planted two trees dedicated in honor of the late humanitarians. The trees were planted on Alliance City School property at Glamorgan Castle, with both men being alumni of Alliance High School and recip-

ients of its Distinguished Alumni Award – Jack in 1996 and Charlie in 2004.

The two men began GAF in March of 1999 with an initial \$44,000 deposit. Today, more than 23 years since that original meeting, the Foundation manages more than \$28 million in assets to support the community.

"Recently, the Foundation trustees and staff held a half-day retreat," said
